He took out the High Priest, then put the high priest's brother Joshua and made him the High Priest Joshua liked to be called Jason. He was a member of the Hellenist party. Joshua (or Jason) was replaced by a man named Menelaus who promised the King to bring him more money than Jason did. When Yochanan protested against the Hellenists, the ruling high priest sent murderers to kill him. Antiochis was in a successful war against Egypt, but messengers from Rome arrived and were commanded to stop the war, meanwhile in Yerushalayim (Jerusalem), a rumor spread that something happened to the king. Thinking he was dead, the Jews rebeled against Menelaus. The dangerous High Priest ran away with his friends. The King came back from Egypt and he was really mad. When he heard what happened in Jerusalem he told his army to fight the Jews. They killed thousands of Jews; then they made a few harsh laws against the Jews. The scrolls were taken away from the Jews or burned. Kosher, Shabbos, and Bris Milah (circumcision) and if you did any of those you would die. Even Rabbi Eliezer, a man of 90, had to eat pork (a non-kosher food); then they put him to death. There were a lot of other people who sacrificed their lives. to keep their faith and Jewish way of life, just like Chana and her seven sons (read Naomi's article to know more about them).

A long time ago in Bethulia, in the land of Judea, the city came under siege by a Greek general, Holofernes. Holofernes




fought hard and bravely in hope that the city would surrender. Fortunately the city did not surrender; In the hopes of starving the people, so Holofernes


decided to block supplies from coming in and out of the city.

The date: 164 BCE


During their occupation of the Holy Land (Israel), the Greeks went into the Holy Temple and defiled all the oil they found. The Maccabees (an army who fought for Hashem) defeated the Greeks. They could only find one cruse of oil with the seal of the high priest intact. It was only enough for one night. Hashem made a miracle and it lasted for eight days which was enough time for new oil to be made.

The Greeks pouring out the oil and defiling it was obviously not an accident. This happened because the Greeks did not like the mitzvahs that connected us to Hashem.

The Greeks wanted to Hellenize (make them convert to their religion and culture) the Jews. They wanted to make us like them. ### Compromise

The miracle of chanukah was totally unnecessary.

Every single child who goes to school knows the story: the Greeks had defiled (made impure) the holy temple's store of oil. Sowhen the Maccabees liberated the temple they could not find ritual pure oil with which to kindle the menorah. Then a single cruse of uncontaminated oil was found, enough to keep the menorah lit for a single day.



Miraculously, the oil burned for eight days, until new oil could be prepared.

According to <u>Chabadorg</u>, "Strictly speaking, none of this was necessary. The law which forbids the use of ritually impure oil in the Temple would not have applied under the circumstances which then prevailed. According to Torah law, the prohibition of impurity, if affecting the entire community is waived-if the entire community, or all the kohanim (priests), or all the Temples vessels are ritually impure, it is permissible to enter the temple and conduct the temple services under conditions of impurity.

Nevertheless G-d wished to show His love for His people: He suspended the laws of nature in order to enable them to rededicate the temple without any compromise on its standards of purity-even if it be a perfectly legal and permissible compromise".

When I was on <u>chabadorg</u> I saw something very interesting and here it is. "Every chanukah we reciprocate in kind. How many lights must be kindled on the chanukah menorah? Most would reply: one on the first night, two on the second and so on. The law, however, is otherwise. According to the talmud, The mitzvah of Chanukah is [fulfilled with] a single light for each household. Those who do more than is

obligatory, kindle a single light for each individual. Those who do more than those who do more than is obligatory... kindle one light on the first day and add an additional light on each succeeding day".

"There are those who buy the least costly tefillin on the market, who give the absolute minimum that the laws of charity mandate, who employ every halachic exemption and loophole they can lay their hands on. But when was the last time you saw a single light in the window of a jewish home on the sixth night of Chanukah? On chanukah we all do more than those who do more than is obligatory-after all, <u>G-d</u> did the same for us".

According to <u>chabadorg</u>, "the name Chanukah comes from the word *chinuch*, which means "inauguration." Chanukah celebrates the renewal of the service in the Holy Temple after it was liberated from the Greek defiler, purified, and rededicated as the seat of the divine presence in our world.

Chanukah serves as a model for all inaugurations, including the most significant inauguration of all-education, a child's inauguration into life (indeed, *chinuch* is also the Hebrew word for "education"). The uncompromising insistence on purity and perfection which Chanukah represents holds an important lesson regarding the essence of the educator's task."

"Compromise is anathema (which is when someone is a enemy or exact opposites) to education. To a mature tree, a gash here or a torn limb there is of little or no consequence. But the smallest scratch in the seed, the slightest nick in the sapling, results in an irrevocable (which means it is not able to be changed) deformity, a flaw which the years to come will deepen rather than erase.

Virtually every life is faced with demands for compromises—some tolerable, others not. The educator who wishes to impart a set of values and priorities that will weather them all, must deliver, in word and example, a message of impeccable purity, free of even the slightest and most acceptable compromise".


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### Our Visit with Meteorologist Greg Dee



On Monday, December 12, Upper Elementary got a visit from the local ABC Action News meteorologist Greg Dee. We asked lots of questions about thunderstorms and his career as a weatherman.

He said the best part of his early morning work shift was getting out early every day. This schedule allows him to visit lots of places in Tampa Bay, like the beach and Busch Gardens. Because everyone else is at school or work, there's less crowds and shorter lines!



We learned about how he uses the green screen and television screens in the studio to deliver his weather forecasts to the community. Did you know he doesn't use a script when he gives the weather forecasts? Because everything is new and up-to-date, there's no time to write a script to read. Mr. Dee has to think on his toes and adlib when he's in front of the camera.



Mr. Dee has to arrive at the studio in time for a 3:00AM meeting! Then he has to study that day's current information, satellite images, radar, and computer models to come up with the forecast. The cameras start rolling at 5:00 am, so he can't be late!

He taught us so much! We learned that lightning is about 50,000°F, and in Tampa Bay, the thunderstorms can produce about 1,000 strikes in an hour. We also learned about the five ways lightning can strike a person:

- 1. A direct strike
- 2. A side flash
- 3. Ground current
- 4. Conduction
- 5. Streamer

He reminded us that if we can hear thunder, we can be struck by lightning. In fact, most people are struck by lightning when they aren't in the rain, they're standing in the dry air outside the thunderstorm.

What a great visit.... It was ELECTRIFYING!!!
